Labor and employment attorney Steven Mitchell Sack, the best-selling author of 20 law books, has spent his 41+ year legal career defending people who have been exploited in the workplace. His mission is to protect employee rights, and he is an advocate for those who have been unfairly treated and discriminated against in their jobs.

Now, attorney Sack has taken his knowledge of fighting for worker rights and created ***FIRED! Protect Your Rights & FIGHT BACK If You're Terminated, Laid Off, Downsized, Restructured, Forced to Resign or Quit***, a comprehensive book about protecting the rights of employees who are removed from their jobs for any reason.

His previous *The Lifetime Legal Guide* for Book-of-the-Month Club sold over 250,000 copies in six editions. He has appeared as a legal expert on *Oprah*, CNN, Fox News, CNBC and hundreds of other television and radio shows. His comments on workplace issues and the rights of fired workers have been featured in *The New York Times*, *The Wall Street Journal*, *Fortune*, *Newsday*, *Business Week* and dozens of other publications.

Mr. Sack has received the prestigious *Long Island Business News* "Leadership in Law Award" several times in the last few years, and has been honored as an "Employment Law Trailblazer." by the *National Law Journal*. Mr. Sack is a nationally known lecturer and hosted a syndicated national radio show on jobs and careers. In a significant legal case, *Samiento v. World Yacht, Inc.*, Mr. Sack and Scott A. Lucas, Esq. obtained a favorable decision for waiters who were denied their tips. This important New York Court of Appeals ruling has made it harder for restaurants and caterers to keep gratuities intended for their wait staffs.
